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
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36th Southeastern Regional Meeting American Chemical Society

CENTENNIAL SCHOLARSHIP AWARD PRESENTED

Mr. Dennis G. Wujek, a graduate student in chemistry at Duke, was the recipient of the Centennial Scholarship Award presented at the Meeting-in-Miniature in April. Mr. Wujek has used the award of \$1500 to support his research in the use of lipid bilayers as hosts for organic reactions.
