ACS and Sexual Harassment

P or several years, the ACS has been focused on addressing the challenges posed in trying to prevent sexual harassment. Some of the Society's efforts pre-date the wave of high-profile revelations about sexual harassment in the workplace and the #MeToo Movement, but these relatively recent developments have intensified the spotlight on the problem of sexual harassment. Unfortunately, chemistry is not immune to this problem. As *C&EN* reported on September 18, 2017, the Chemical Enterprise suffers from the same problems as does the larger science community and the nation. https://cen.acs.org/ articles/95/i37/Confrontingsexual-harassmentchemistry.html

In a report released last June, the National Academies of Science, Engineering & Medicine found that sexual harassment is pervasive throughout academic science in the United States, driving talented researchers out of the field and harming others' careers. https://cen.acs.org/careers/women-in-science/Sexual-harassment-pervasive-science-National/96/i25

One part of the Report is of special interest. The Academies noted that professional societies such as the ACS "are a powerful influence and important part of the career and advancement of those in science ..." The Academies called on professional societies to join academic institutions in addressing sexual harassment.

One area in which ACS has directly addressed sexual harassment and other inappropriate behaviors is in confronting harassment arising at our national meetings. As part of this effort, it is important for our governance

leaders to be aware of the ACS Volunteer/National Meeting Attendee Conduct Policy. The Board of Directors adopted this Policy in December of 2013. If you haven't had a chance to review this policy, please do so. The policy is available at: https://www.acs.org/content/dam/acsorg/about/governance/charter/acs-volunteer-national-meeting-attendee-policy.pdf.

This detailed Policy prohibits "inappropriate actions based on race, gender, age, religion, ethnicity, nationality, sexual orientation, gender expression, gender identify, ... [or] presence of disabilities." It continues, providing that "Disruptive, harassing, or inappropriate behavior toward other volunteers, stakeholders, or staff is unacceptable." Harassment of any kind ... will not be tolerated."

ACS takes the problem of sexual harassment seriously. At the 2018 New Orleans national meeting, C&EN and the Women's Chemistry Committee presented a symposium on sexual harassment in the sciences. ACS President Peter Dorhout conducted the Council's August 2018 Special Discussion in Boston on how scientific societies can address issues of sexual harassment in the sciences. ACS is following up on many of the suggestions generated at the Council meeting.

For instance, at the January Board of Directors orientation, the Board received a comprehensive presentation: Addressing the Challenges Posed by Sexual Harassment. Throughout the year, ACS Committees will be offered an abbreviated version of this presentation. We expect to provide training to more than one hundred governance members at the ACS national meetings. Look for more information on preventing sexual harassment on the ACS website.

Governance members should recognize that prohibited harassment can take many forms. As exemplified in some of the worst public scandals that have come to light, harassment includes sexual assault and other criminal behavior. Victims and witnesses of these actions should contact law enforcement as soon as possible. But harassment also encompasses unwelcome verbal, visual or physical conduct, based on an individual's protected characteristic, creating an intimidating, offensive, or hostile environment. Harassment can be verbal (including unwelcome slurs, jokes, insults, epithets, gestures or teasing), graphic or physical conduct that

denigrates or shows hostility or aversion towards an individual because of any protected characteristic. And finally, sexual harassment can include all of these actions, as well as other unwelcome conduct, such as unwelcome or unsolicited sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, conversations regarding sexual activities and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature.

If you are the victim of inappropriate behavior at a national meeting, or if you see inappropriate behavior, please report violations to ACS Secretary and General Counsel or the Chair of the Board of Directors. The 2019 Committee Demographic Survey The ConC Subcommittee on Diversity

One of the goals of the Committee on Committees (ConC) is a diverse national governing body that provides everyone with a voice in shaping ACS. A diverse leadership aids the ACS in serving all of its members while allowing the ACS to be cognizant of subtle societal changes.

In 2016, ConC created the first ACS national committee demographic survey to serve as a baseline of continued sampling of our committee demographics. The survey also serves as an educational tool to broaden committee members' awareness on the variety of race/ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, and employment sector representation by our membership. ConC believes holding the survey every three years allows us to gauge how the identity of those participating in national governance is changing. ConC will use the aggregated data to

learn about the makeup of our committee volunteers and to guide our future inclusion efforts.

The ConC 2019 demographics survey is open and volunteers on the 32 ACS council-related committees are encouraged to participate. The survey is being administered by Survey Design & Analysis -- the independent survey firm that conducted the 2016 survey -- and is open through Thursday, April 11th (the week after the Orlando National Meeting). The 2016 survey had an excellent participation rate of 76% across the Council-related committees and we hope to have a similar response rate this year. The survey is voluntary, takes about 5-10 minutes, and is confidential. It is important to state the demographics information is being collected for educational purposes and no attempt will be made to correlate the results with the individual providing the information.

ADVOCACY

Join <u>Act4Chemistry</u>, ACS' grassroots legislative advocacy network, to stay up-to-date on policy issues and contact legislators on behalf of chemistry and chemists.

How to meet with your elected officials.

It is easier to meet elected offi-

cials in their local district offices, where they have more time, rather than in Washington, D.C.

- Contact the legislator's scheduler to arrange an appointment. Introduce yourself as a constituent, and explain the purpose of the meeting.
 - Set a meeting date and time. Schedule the meeting for about 15-30 minutes.
 - ♦ If your elected official is not available, set up the meeting with an appropriate staff person.
- Prepare for the meeting. Research the legislator's opinions as well as his or her current and past positions on your issue.
 - Prepare simple, to-thepoint information about your issue that can be used during the meeting and left behind.
 - ♦ Prepare your message. Stick to one issue.
 - ♦ Know how much time you will have, and plan accordingly.
 - ♦ Anticipate questions. Write them down. Pre-

- pare answers.
- ♦ Bring a notebook and a pen.
- Assign someone to lead the group, if applicable, and define everyone's role.
- Confirm your appointment the day before the meeting.
- Arrive about 10 minutes early.
- Distribute the information you've prepared for the meeting, and explain your issue. Emphasize how the issue could affect the district.
- If the legislator has a history of supporting your issue, acknowledge that and thank him/her, but be ready to quickly move to the "new" aspect you wish to discuss. Be clear about the "ask" you are making.
- If the legislator disagrees with you, stand up for yourself and be prepared to debate the issues, but do not become overly argumentative.
- Remain nonpolitical.

- Keep emphasizing the positives of your viewpoint, and end the meeting on a positive note.
- Express thanks for him or her taking time to meet with you, and determine the next steps.
- Always send a follow-up letter, thanking the legislator or staff member(s), and include any additional information you offered to provide.

Procedures for Distributing Local Section Allotments Jason Ritchie, Chair, Committee on Local Section Activities

he Committee on Local Section Activities (LSAC) will make a recommendation to Council in Orlando regarding the distribution of dues funds (allotments) for local sections (that is, the "local section dues pool"). This recommendation to Council is a duty specified for LSAC in the ACS Bylaws (Bylaw VIII, Sec. 8). LSAC will recommend leaving the existing allotment formula unchanged.

Local Sections and Divisions receive an allotment equal to 20% of the membership dues revenue, which is split 55% for Local Sections, and 45% for Divisions (Bylaw XIII, Sec. 3 b). The local section portion of this dues revenue includes a base allotment for local sections, an allotment tied to total section membership, and "distributions based on other factors such as Society initiatives, strategic planning and Board directives."

The existing Council-approved allocation formula, which has been in place since 2013, applies fixed percentages for a base and per capita allocation, as well as LSAC program funds as indicated in the table below.

Distribution Categories	Allocation (Percent)
Base Allotment (BA)	49%
Per Member Allotment (PMA)	43%
LSAC Program Funds (PF)	8%

Currently, the total base allotment (BA) of 49% of the total Local Section Allocation is shared equally among all local sections. The per - member allotment (PMA) of 43% of the total

Local Section Allocation is divided by the total number of local section members, and distributed according to the number of members in each section. The LSAC program funds (PF) of 8% of the total Local Section Allocation are used to support Society initiatives, strategic planning, and Board directives. LSAC uses these funds to support programs such as Innovative Project Grants (IPGs), Science Café Mini-grants, ACS Leadership Development System Grants, Members Engaging Through Technology Grants, and ACS Leadership Institute travel stipends. All LSAC allotments and program funds are expended in the year they are allocated, and 100% of these funds are spent for the direct benefit of local sections.

The percentages used in the allocation formula are based on historical averages of base & per capita allocations and replaced an earlier formula that mandated increases based on changes in the Consumer Price Index. The previous formula did not take into account the actual monies available for allocation and as a result, it was determined that the base and per member allocations alone would eventually exceed the total funds available for distribution. The current formula preserves a fixed percentage for the three distribution categories shown above.



mitted to encouraging more of this critical member-tomember engagement. Starting in 2020, MAC will be establishing a new ChemLuminary award to recognize the Local Section and Division responsible for the novel recruitment activities or membership drives during the 2019 calendar year. It is our hope that this award and the others already established with similar intent - catalyze our champion members and our critical component groups to think about the role that they can play in making a better ACS.

2020 Committee Appointment Process Carolyn Ribes, Chair, Committee on Committees

Although it seems early, it's already time to start considering the 2020 committee appointment process. At ACS, the Committee on Committees (ConC) recommends ACS members to the ACS President and/or Board Chair, who make the actual appointments. To assist it in this process, ConC uses an online preference form to collect input from ACS volunteers about their interests, experience, and expertise. ConC seeks to identify and involve individuals from across the Society - including members with a wide range of experiences, backgrounds and perspectives - in order to ensure that the ACS remains relevant, innovative, and effective, and that their committee experience is rewarding. The use of the online system helps to streamline the approval process, and all submissions will be reviewed by ConC as it develops appointment/reappointment recommendations at the fall ACS national meeting.

If you wish to be considered for an appointment on a committee, ConC now requires that you provide specific details/rationale about your qualifications/expertise for each committee that you are interested in. You may use the online preference form to register your interest in up to four national committees. This is

helpful in case your first, second, or even your third choice is not available. The online preference form will be open from March 18-June 7, 2019.

Who should fill out the form? It is recommended for everyone interested in serving on a national ACS Committee, especially committee associates and those finishing a term, those who will reach the statutory limit (final year) on their present committee, and those who are up for reelection as Councilor for a Technical Division or Local Section. If you are in the middle of a multiyear appointment, you do not need to fill out the form. If you do fill it out, then your current committee assignment will automatically appear as your first choice.

If you are a Councilor on a Standing Committee* and your Councilor seat is up for re-election in 2019, please do fill out a preference form. If you should lose your Council seat, then you will no longer be eligible for that Standing Committee. Membership on the three Elected Committees (Committee on Committees, Council Policy, and Nominations and Elections) is determined by vote of the Council. ConC recommends that all nominees for the Elected Committees fill out the preference form. Please notify secretary@acs.org if you have an

interest in one or more of these committees and your name will be brought to the attention of the appropriate nominating committee.

There are several ways for you to gather information about different committees. Contact the Chair and/or staff liaison or ConC liaison of that committee to learn about their goals and discuss your interest. You can also review the committee's webpage to learn more about its activities. Consider attending its Open Meeting at the spring or fall national meeting or review committee reports from the Council Meeting (oral and written). This will help you decide if this committee is right for you.




